I could have spoken today on many different subjects since Mr. Beckwith simply asked me to give a state of the school address. But I decided to speak on an issue that I think all of us, including myself, can work on, namely, the principle of self-government is a guiding principle of this school. It is in the mission statement as a founding reason that this school exists "...to

learn to reason and discern between right and wrong, truth and error; develop character and self-discipline of mind and body; and conduct ourselves in all aspects of life as Christians." ...

On a large scale this has been accomplished. Rarely, if at all, do we hear of stealing, fighting, swearing, or

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
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lying at our school; but what about the small things? What about the non-uniform jackets in class, the snowball at recess, the untidy shelves in the student prep-room, the crumbs on the lunch table left by a student anxious to play outside? It is these "small things" that I would like to speak about today.

With small things, the question "why?" often comes up. "What difference does it make to have an untidy prep-room if we clean it up sooner or later?" "Will one little snowball make a difference in the outcome of my life?" The answer is that it does make a difference, however small.

President Benson said, "Making decisions is probably the most important thing people ever do." Life is made up of decisions, and so every decision makes up your life. In C. S. Lewis's *The Screwtape Letters*, Screwtape (an experienced devil) says to his nephew, Wormwood, an inexperienced devil, "For they constantly forget, what you must always remember, that they are animals and that whatever their bodies do affects their souls." We are not animals, but we are a soul, made up of a spirit and a body, and whatever our bodies do affects our soul.

Every little thing, such as dropping a wadded up Starburst wrapper, or not reminding someone to remove his or her non-uniform jacket before an administrator has to, affects our soul. When we cease to participate in disobedience, and in its place act and encourage others to act in obedience, we become strong — and we increase the unity and strength of the School. It is the small decisions that make us strong.

Longfellow stated, "The heights by great men reached and kept were not attained by sudden flight, but they, while their companions slept, were toiling upward in the night." Not littering or not breaking the rules is not enough. We are better than that, for not doing something is simply neutrality, and we are not a neutral School. Laziness is in both neutrality and disobedience. How much effort would it take to pick up a piece of garbage on the floor, or take off our jackets when we come into school, or keep our cubbies clean? The answer is, not much. Reminding others, encouraging them to obey the rules, does not take much effort.

Kaden Caldwell, our last Student Government president, was an excellent example of this. At recess when everyone else was throwing snowballs, we would see Kaden out there telling us, without much success, to stop throwing snowballs and obey the rules. Few, if any, stopped throwing snowballs immediately, but Kaden continued to speak out against it. His voice for obedience weighed upon my conscience as I am sure it did upon others, to the point that eventually I stopped throwing snowballs.

There are many stories about the power of one person in speaking out against disobedience to the small and simple rules. Alma 37:41 states, "Nevertheless, because those miracles were worked by small means it did show unto them marvelous works. They were slothful, and forgot to exercise their faith and diligence and then those marvelous works ceased, and they did not progress in their journey." It was by obedience in small deeds that the marvelous works came to pass, and it was by slothfulness in those small deeds that the marvelous works ceased.

This principle is as true for our School in 2009 as it was for the people in 73 B.C. If we cease our slothfulness and replace it with small deeds of obedience and righteousness, marvelous works will come to pass. President Kimball said, "We help to develop a world where vice is unprofitable, uncomfortable, and disappointing."

By our actions we can make even the smallest vice uncomfortable, we can make the smallest rule big, and we can make great works come to pass. I hope we will exercise our influence to make righteousness and obedience, even to the smallest degree, the "Norm." AHS means "Always Honor and Serve" – in all things – and encourage others to do the same. Thank you!

Good parents bring their children up in truth and light. Good parents pray personally and teach their children to pray. Good parents teach their children in the home. American Heritage Lyceum Philharmonic, BYU-Idaho Symphony, to Perform <u>Side-by-Side Concert</u>



As reported in the Daily Herald, the BYU-Idaho Symphony directed by Dr. Robert Tueller has invited American Heritage School's own Lyceum Philharmonic to perform side-byside with them on stage in Rexburg, April 1, 2009. This

represents another opportunity for American Heritage Youth Orchestra students get the inside track to university admissions and scholarships. Students who have played with the Lyceum Philharmonic for the past three years will now have performed with the BYU Philharmonic, University of Utah Philharmonia, and BYU-Idaho Symphony.

American Heritage Lyceum Philharmonic students go far beyond what the average student is able to experience at a college visit. In fact, Dr. Tueller made a special trip to American Heritage School on March 18th to work with the American Heritage Lyceum Philharmonic in preparation for an April 1st bus trip to Rexburg to rehearse and perform side-by-side with the musicians of BYU-Idaho (some of whom our students will recognize from earlier seasons at the Lyceum Philharmonic!).

Each university program that has hosted the Lyceum Philharmonic has seen players from the orchestra attend their music programs and receive scholarships. The program works well for both student and university: students get an inside look at what it would be like to attend and universities get a chance to attract talent that might otherwise have gone out of state or to a different program.

"Each year we try to give students the chance to find out what school is right for them," remarked director Kayson Brown. "It's hard to know exactly what you're getting yourself into when you apply to a college music program. This way at least our students know the director, can talk to the college students about what it's like to go there, and can get a feel for what it would be like to attend. I can't think of a better way to make an educated decision about your education."

For those who are unable to attend the collaborative concert event on April 1st at BYU-Idaho, the Lyceum Philharmonic will be performing the same works at home in the American Heritage School Auditorium April 8th at 7:00 pm. The concert is free and open to the public.

Additional Parking - Coming Soon!

We are pleased to announce that American Heritage School has agreed to purchase and develop over an acre of land immediately north of (adjacent to) the School's northern driveway - for the purpose of additional parking and landscaping. As with all major capital improvements to the School, this new parking lot has been funded by donations to the School. Approximately 120 new stalls will be added, including a three lane access, which, in addition to the parking and access on the east side of the building, will dramatically increase the efficiency and safety during carpool and special events. The north parking lot will also be the designated parking lot for any student drivers that we will have in years to come. ACT Exam Information

Congratulations to the 9th grade students who completed the ACT EXPLORE. Students interested in a baseline performance measure on an actual ACT may be interested in taking an ACT well in advance of their junior year.

BYU and many other universities and colleges consider only a student's highest ACT score when making admission and scholarship decisions, no matter how many times a student takes the test. Therefore, it will be advantageous for most students to take the ACT multiple times. In fact, 55% of students who retake the ACT improve their score by one to three points! This is a good reason to take the ACT sooner rather than later, and to take it multiple times.

For students interested in taking an actual ACT soon, the next actual ACT will be administered on June 13, 2009. The cost is \$31.00. Go to www.act.org to register no later than May 8!



Science & Invention Fair!!

The annual American Heritage School Science & Invention Fair will be held April 21-22. Participation in the Science & Invention Fair is mandatory for all fourth, sixth, eighth, and tenth grade science students and optional for all other students in the School. Sixth, eighth, and tenth grade students are producing science projects using the scientific method and all fourth grade students are producing an invention. Fifth seventh and ninth grade students will receive extra credit in science if they choose to participate in the fair.

Please note the following guidelines for 6^{th} 8^{th} and 10^{th} Grade participants:

- Students should approve the project with their parents and with Mr. Miller or Mrs. Logan <u>prior</u> to starting.
- All students in the 10th grade should choose a project in the Life Science or Biology field

- (Mrs. Logan will provide direction for students in Biology)
- As you work, identify and apply the steps of the scientific method. Thinking through the process of the scientific method, then applying each step, is one of the most important learning experiences associated with the science fair.
- Make sure the project presents a specific question that can be solved through the proper use of research and documentation. Don't worry if your hypothesis ultimately proves inaccurate! Attention to the scientific method is far more important that the accuracy of the hypothesis.
- Each project should include a poster board display to explain the project, as well as a written paper to provide detailed documentation to be evaluated by the Science Department.
- Each project will be displayed in the recreation hall for other students and parents to view the innovative work of our students.
- Any components of a project that are potentially harmful if touched or ingested should be brought to the attention of Mr. Miller or Mrs. Logan prior to being put on display.

Please note the following guidelines <u>for all 4th</u> Grade participants:

The criteria for the 4th Grade Inventions and point allocations (150 total points possible) are as follows:

- 1. *A self-supporting upright display*. (No larger than 36" x 36") This display should contain:
 - a. A title of the model or prototype (5 pts.);
 - b. A statement of purpose (10 pts.);
 - c. A diagram of the device (10 pts.). The best and detailed drawing should be here; and
 - d. A description or explanation of how the invention works and how the invention might improve life today or in the future (10 pts.).
- 2. A journal (log) of your ideas and work. This will help show the originality of your idea, and it will allow you to track the steps in your inventive process. The journal should be organized with dividers labeled A-F. Make sure to date and initial your log every time you work on your invention (5 pts.). Each journal section should contain the following:
 - <u>Journal Section A (50 pts.)</u>: The first four steps to creating your invention should be described in this section ("Steps to Creating an Invention" will be sent home separately with students). After you have identified your invention, you may continue with Journal Sections B-G.
 - <u>Journal Section B (20 pts.)</u>: Describe all your ideas, make a drawing of your ideas, tests, work and results using Steps 5, 6, and 8 of "Steps to Creating an Invention."
 - <u>Journal Section C (10 pts.)</u>: Keep records of the costs of the materials (Step 7 of "Steps to Creating an Invention").
 - <u>Journal Section D (10 pts.):</u> Answer the question "What problem does your invention solve?" Use as much detail as possible and use complete sentences.
 - <u>Journal Section E (10 pts.):</u> Answer the question "Who might benefit for your invention?" Use as much detail as possible and use complete sentences.
 - <u>Journal Section F (10 pts.):</u> Answer the question "What makes your invention unique or different from others?" Use as much detail as possible, and use complete sentences.

Make sure to use a folder or binder to organize your invention journal and label all dividers as indicated above!

All projects and inventions are due on April 21st. Start working on your projects early! Start now! Good luck students!


