# Message From the Board


The following remarks were delivered by Laurie Swim, Chairman of the Board of American Heritage School, at the recent American Heritage Gala held on April 24, 2008. Fraser Bullock, co-founder of Sorensen Capital, and special musical guest Jon Schmidt, headlined the gala, which was attended by over 200 specially invited guests, including prominent leaders in government, business and education.

Mr. Bullock, board members, faculty, and friends-- thank you for sharing this inaugural Capital Campaign Gala event with us. Thank you to our "Dream Team" gala committee members who have given their best efforts to

making this an evening to remember. Special thanks to Grant Beckwith and Dan Roberts for their vision and leadership.

You have been invited tonight because you are kindred spirits. You are friends who understand the importance of family, children, and character-based education in context of faith and eternal principles. You are friends we think will understand the vision and value of what we are trying to accomplish.

Tonight represents a significant occasion for a little school with very humble beginnings. On August 31, 1970, American Heritage School opened its doors with 80 students and textbooks from an Arizona landfill. Nearly four decades later, the school has enrollment of over 450 with waiting lists that continue to grow. It has become a model for families and educators nationwide who are seeking an educational atmosphere in which Christ-centered curriculum places "God, Family, Country and Academic Excellence" deeply in the hearts and minds of children. Not only is our curriculum Christ-centered, but we endeavor to have the light of the Restored Gospel woven into everything we do.




May I share just a few thoughts on our mission, our heritage and our goal, to give you a sense of what drives us and where we are going:

<u>Our Mission.</u> Our mission is to assist and complement parents in developing the hearts and minds of children. Learning is primarily a spiritual matter.

#### As President Hinckley has said,

"Each day we are made increasingly aware of the fact that life is more than science and mathematics, more than history and literature. There is a need for another education without which the substance of our secular learning may lead only to our destruction. I refer to the education of the heart, of the conscience, of the character, of the spirit-these undefinable aspects of our personalities which determine so certainly what we are and what we do in our relationships one with another." [Teachings of Gordon B. Hinckley, pp. 167-168]

<u>Our Heritage</u>. For over 37 years, three principles have guided American Heritage School: Faith, Sacrifice, and Patriotism.



Faith: The school was founded for a spiritual purpose above all else. All truth comes from God; He is the Source. Our children must understand who they are: children of a loving God who wants them to understand eternal truths.

A recent U.S. Secretary of Education lamented that:

Many schools no longer possess a moral center. Their teachers have been discouraged from taking up character training in a direct fashion. They are reluctant to "impose their

values" on students. Their overriding concern is to demonstrate how tolerant they are of others' behavior and choices. They feel that saying to children "What you are doing is bad and wrong" might trample their rights, inflict feelings of shame, or damage their selfesteem. Meanwhile, more and more young Americans graduate with a shaky sense of right and wrong. (William Bennett, The Educated Child, p. 15)

Sacrifice: The sacrifice of founders, parents, teachers, staff, volunteers, and donors is central to our mission. Sacrifice consecrates our efforts and keeps our eyes focused on the right objectives.

We are a national culture that is driven to "save the world" in many different ways – often times for good and noble causes – but if the education in our classrooms and homes is causing our children to languish in mediocrity, individualism, amorality, or even worse, immorality, how long can we as a nation endure? "To what end" our sacrifice? At American Heritage School – our sacrifice is for our children, and for the preservation of their homes and families in one nation under God!

Patriotism: We believe in the Providential Hand in our nation's history. "Children of Liberty learn from the past." (American Heritage School Song.) Without a correct understanding of political freedom there is no religious freedom. Political freedom preserves our gift of agency. Agency must be attended by a correct understanding of self-discipline and self-government. Indeed, each of the American Founders understood this simple but profound Bible verse: "Where the Spirit of the Lord is—there is liberty!" (2 Cor. 3:17). This is our view of America's identity and heritage.

Our goal is for children to become Our Goal. instruments in the hands of God as they develop faith and Christian character. American Heritage School is not a church, nor is it a seminary, nor is it a "church school". But neither do we want our children to feel that Christian character and moral principles are something that belong only in church. Even this building is designed to remind them of that. Above each of our outside doors is a virtue that we want each child to internalize and apply: Humility, Faith, Charity, Courage, Self-Government, Virtue, Industry and Wisdom. We want our students to learn both faith and facts. History repeatedly teaches us that civilizations rise and fall according to their Christian

character. As children develop these virtues and master the rigorous academic material that they will encounter here, they will be better prepared to fulfill their divine missions in life.

Let us share a short seven-minute video that we believe captures what we are all about:

So where is the school today as it works to accomplish its mission and goal? A brief view of our history helps to answer this question:

Many years ago, a widow named Alice Greene attended our Patriotic Program. Impressed by what she saw and felt, she asked how she might help the school. Dr. Verlan Andersen suggested to her (somewhat light-heartedly) "You could pay off our mortgage." Within weeks Mrs. Greene sent a check



to cover the mortgage, and American Heritage School has been free of debt ever since. I hope someday to meet Mrs. Greene and personally thank her for blessing my children.

At the other end of the sacrifice spectrum is a ziploc bag of coins in Mr. Beckwith's office. It came from the piggy bank of a kindergarten student who, upon

hearing that we were trying to raise money to expand our building and bless more families, decided to empty his piggy bank to "help the school."

Today, tuition only covers the general operating costs of the school. This building, including all equipment, amenities, and capital improvements, have been and continue to be gifted by donors, exemplified by Mrs. Greene and our kindergarten student.

Our goal is to raise \$4 million for the building expansion by the end of this year to expand our

program, which will enable us to serve more families. This expansion will provide music facilities and classrooms for our high school students as well more space for our elementary grades.

But our efforts are not just intended to serve families currently enrolled at the school. We desire to extend our reach and influence to families who are NOT at the School! This is not about one school in American Fork, Utah. It is about assisting families everywhere who seek an educational atmosphere in which Christ-centered curriculum places "God, Family, Country and Academic Excellence" deeply in the hearts and minds of children. With the blessings of technology this vision can become a reality. It begins with creating a replicable K-12 model that can truly be a light to the world.

We cannot do this alone! Tonight, I invite you to join Mrs. Greene and that special kindergarten child to make a difference.

We thank our current patrons who are giving what they can. We have raised almost \$700,000 of the \$4 million goal over the last year thanks to generous and devoted supporters who share the vision of the School. Matching contributions are committed to multiply the support given by individuals and families, including a pledge of \$500,000 that will be donated to the School once we reach the \$1.5 million milestone in our campaign.

Here are six key reasons why I believe this school merits your financial support:

- 1. The school carries no debt. It operates on fiscally sound principles and budgets.
- 2. The school has strong, capable leadership—the strongest it has ever had. This last year the Board created a 20 year Core Strategic Plan for the future.
- 3. Our teachers and curriculum just keep getting better! If you haven't seen one of our classrooms of students and teachers at work, we invite you to "come and see." That visit will inform and inspire you more than anything we could ever say.

4. By continuing to use tuition only for operations and seeking donations for major facilities projects, we can continue to assist families in their educational goals. For many of our patrons, tuition is still a real sacrifice, but it is within their reach.



- 5. We have never taken a dollar from the government. Every dollar we have used came because dedicated people believed in us. We work hard to be good stewards.
- 6. Because we are privately funded, we are truly free provide Christcentered education in a secular largely world where parents are desperately seeking a spiritual foundation for the education of their children.

May I conclude with a paragraph from the dedicatory

prayer which expresses our unique mission:

"...dear Father, wilt Thou bless all who come and enter here with a sense of the sacred and holy purpose of this building; that a spirit of joy coupled with reverence may always be here, that hearts may be softened, spirits lifted, and faith and character increased while valuable knowledge and skills are gained. And may the spirit of sacrifice never be lost among all those who associate with this institution." [Dedicatory Prayer, September 2002]

Again, thank you for your attendance and interest tonight. I invite each of you to look within yourselves and ask what you can do to help us in carrying the American Heritage legacy of family, children, and faith centered education forward.

#### **Student Submissions**

To Heed (by Jacob Kleinman, 7<sup>th</sup> Grade)

The definition of the word "to heed" is 1. (v) "to give careful attention to" and 2. (n) "careful attention; notice; observation."

With these definitions I am able to reason the principle of beholding. In the first definition it says that when you give heed you "give care..." – and you have to care to behold or observe something. "Take ye heed, watch and pray" (Mark 13:33). "Listen unto them and give heed, or they stand against you at the judgement-seat of Christ." (Moroni 8:21). Maxwell said that "for all who heed it, the Book of Mormon is like the flinging open of long-closed doors on what was assumed to be a complete canon of scripture. Given such breathtaking revelations and translations, let us, therefore, heed King Benjamin's counsel: 'Believe in God...believe that man doth not comprehend all the things which the Lord can comprehend." With the help of these wise people, I have reasoned that the principle of heeding is *knowing* and beholding. I would like you, the reader, to go back and in all of these quotes, and substitute know and behold for heed. After you have read them with a new understanding, you heed (know and behold) that if we heed our righteous leaders and do as they have commanded us, we will, by nature, obey and achieve.

It will be hard, but we will never look back on making the choice of knowing His Plan; it is our responsibility, though, to go back and help push others up to where we are, though we cannot do it for them. We can tell them of the glory that lies ahead.

If we know the Book of Mormon, it will be as a sword of light against the armies of the devil, which will allow us to see through even the darkest of times. It can shine even on others, that they may make their own Light. And God can see beyond the mist, and He has sent down His Light that we may see all that we must, to return to the sight above the mist.

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# From Beowulf to the Book of Mormon (9<sup>th</sup> Grade 4-R Collaboration)

The following is a collaborative in-class "4-R" project that was done by the 9<sup>th</sup> Grade scholars in the course of one morning after their personal study of both Beowulf and the Book of Mormon. The "4-R" methodology used at American Heritage School requires students to "Research" by studying original source documents, "Reason" by extracting moral principles from their research, "Relate" by comparing the research and reasoning to the students' personal lives, and finally "Record" by carefully articulating and writing the principles and lessons learned from the first three steps of the process.

In the following example, the scholars read Beowulf (hero in the Old English heroic epic poem Beowulf) and the story of Ammon, the missionary hero in The Book of Mormon, and then, as a class, drew the following connections between the two heroes:

- 1. Both heroes have super-human strength:
- 2. Both heroes deal with long-standing problems.
- 3. Both heroes are able to do what no one else can do.
- 4. Beowulf and Ammon both came from their homeland to a foreign land.
- 5. Both came as a sacrifice to serve others to establish peace.
- 6. Neither came expecting a reward, though both were offered such.
- 7. Each came with carefully selected companions who were faithful to the cause.
- 8. They were met at first by hostile guardians of a king.
- 9. Both heroes acted rather than re-acted to their circumstances; each refused to be a victim.
- 10. Both encountered villains who opposed them (Unfirth and King Limhi).
- 11. Both had a fundamental enemy to conquer.
- 12. At first their foes did not fear them.
- 13. Both heroes acknowledged the power of God.
- 14. Both conquered enemies that sought personal gain, by literal removal of arms in close combat near water.
- 15. Both sets of enemies fled with arms.
- 16. Both victories were hailed as matchless.

- 17. Both heroes did battle with a foe's parent.
- 18. Both carried arms to the king.
- 19. Both were deliverers to people.
- 20. Both contain the same elements of style: litotes, kennings, alliteration, epic poem (story).

Once this "<u>reasoning</u>" step of comparing, contrasting, and drawing principles from the plot and

characters was accomplished, the students next related these conclusions to the story of Christ, and finally to individual examples from their personal lives, which they recorded in their personal class notes and journals. The 4-R process is a powerful learning technique! Try it at home sometime! Have some fun with it around the dinner table!

### AHS Soccer Takes League Honors


American Heritage School's inaugural soccer season in the Charter and Small School League (CSS) was a tremendous success! The students had a wonderful time playing together and

All families, please note that it is essential for incoming sixth grade students (and higher) to have mastered their addition, subtraction, multiplication (through 12x12), and division facts by the time the school year begins. A few minutes each day learning and practicing math facts through the summer will make a tremendous difference in student's performance in their upper-grade math courses. Daily drills using flash cards or a computer programs such as "Math Blaster" or "Quarter Mile Math" have proven to be highly effective. It is difficult for students to learn advanced math concepts if they are still struggling with their basic math facts. Students who master their basic math facts progress more rapidly and easily with increasingly advanced match concepts. Math facts are fun! Make them a part of your summer routine!



#### 2008/2009 Daily Schedule Reminder

As previously announced, we continue to remind you that the following schedule changes will take effect with the 2008/2009 academic year:

- All grades 7 and higher will attend classes on a 5-day per week basis. This is a change to the current schedule of approximately every other Friday as a non-school day for teacher inservice. Inservice training for teachers in grades 7-10 will be conducted on various "early out" days during the calendar year.
- All grades 7 and higher will begin classes at 8:10 a.m. and conclude the day at 3:10 p.m. This is a change to the current 8:30 a.m. to 3:05 p.m. schedule and will accommodate the schedules beginning in 7<sup>th</sup> grade as outlined in the "High School Update Letter, January 9, 2008". The start-time for early morning seminary is a CES will be 7:10 a.m. and another section of seminary will be offered during the class day (6<sup>th</sup> period).

The daily schedule for grades K-6 will remain unchanged (begin classes at 8:30 a.m. and conclude the day at 3:05 p.m.) As is currently the practice in most classrooms, beginning at 8:15 a.m., teachers in grades K-6 will provide supplemental enrichment activities, including possibly an open recreation hall, for students who arrive early and are awaiting the 8:30 bell. As always, if families have special circumstances pertaining to arrival or dismissal, we will be as flexible as possible to accommodate those schedules.





# American Heritage School 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Summer Shakespeare Tour 2008







<u>Date</u>: June 24-26, 2008 (Tue-Thur.)

<u>Estimated Cost</u>: Cost per participant is estimated to be not more than \$250/student, including lodging, transportation, and some meals (see "Meals" below).

#### **Preliminary Itinerary**:

- <u>Tuesday, June 24</u>: Arrive in Cedar City, Utah early afternoon (hotel check-in) and then proceed directly to the 2:00 p.m. performance of Shakespeare's *The Taming of the Shrew* at the Randall L. Jones Theatre followed by "Green Show" on the Shakespearean festival grounds. Lodging in Cedar City that evening.
- Wednesday, June 25: Breakfast buffet at the hotel and then morning devotional in Bryce Canyon. Return to the Utah Shakespeare Festival grounds for afternoon (2 p.m.) production of *Fiddler on the Roof* at the Randall Jones Theatre. Proceed to St. George for a barbecue dinner at Tuachan followed by an evening performance of *The Sound of Music* at the Tuachan Amphitheatre. Lodging in St. George.
- <u>Thursday, June 26</u>: Breakfast buffet at the hotel and then proceed to Church history sites in St. George (temple, Brigham Young home, Tabernacle). Return home early afternoon.

<u>Meals</u>: Meals that are included with the tour cost include a breakfast buffet on Wednesday morning, dinner at the Tuachan Performing Arts Center on Wednesday evening, and another breakfast buffet on Thursday morning. Meals that should be self-provided include lunch and dinner on Tuesday (don't forget to eat a good breakfast before you come Tuesday morning), as well as lunch on Wednesday and Thursday.

<u>Transportation</u>. Transportation is included in the \$250 estimate *unless* we are unable to obtain volunteer parent drivers, in which case we will need to make a decision about alternative transportation methods, such as chartering a bus, which could increase the cost. Volunteer drivers will be reimbursed for fuel costs.


